

From the MESSENGER



MESSENGER magazine is the official magazine of the Church of the Brethren. The magazine traces its beginnings to 1851, when Henry Kurtz published the first issue of *The Gospel Visitor*. The first issue of what was then called *The Gospel Messenger* was published in 1883. It was considered the official church paper, though it was not actually owned by the church until 1897, when the church assumed ownership of the Brethren Publishing House.

In 1965, the paper became a biweekly magazine, took on a completely new look, and shortened its name—

to simply MESSENGER. It now has 10 issues annually, with combined issues in January/February and July/August. While MESSENGER is chiefly a print magazine, it offers selected articles online

at www.brethren.org/messenger. Most congregants read it online with only a few who subscribe to the print issues as is true with most print magazines today. The church library has past issues for reading. The church office also receives issues with the current print at the hospitality table. The May issue contains several good articles including two on Annual Conference. Feel free to take the current issue home to read or, of course, read it online.

A grant of \$3,500 has been given for the community garden project of Community of Joy Church of the Brethren in Salisbury, Md. This project is a new venture with Choices Academy, a local alternative school for at-risk students. Funds will be used to purchase materials to build a movable high tunnel (unheated greenhouse) and to purchase top soil.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE FOCUS



In the last issue of Refrigerator News, an article highlighted the conversations that will take place during the usual business sessions at the 2019 Annual Conference. The conversations will encourage balanced discussion around three areas of visioning. The areas are:

How congregations are serving and ministering in and through their life together, helping us understand what is important to congregations and how we might better equip and support one another as we embrace our common passions for ministry in our local settings.

Annual Conference is the highest and final legislative authority in the Church of the Brethren, including all matters of procedure, program, polity



and discipline. It is held annually in different locations, chosen to bring the annual meeting into every area where Brethren have congregations. The authority of Conference has its source in the delegates elected by local congregations and district, who come together as a deliberative body under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. The voting body consists of two sets of delegates – those representing local congregations and those from church districts.
